Welcome to Oregon ATV Safety

Oregon ATV Safety™ - Youth Rider Endorsement Program plays an integral role in helping young ATV riders get endorsed so they can have fun and stay safe while riding on Oregon public lands. Attending a class does not guarantee endorsement. This is not a training class. It is a class to allow your child to demonstrate his or her safe riding skills. Starting January 01, 2012, a hands-on endorsement and an operator's permit will be required by Oregon Administrative Rule (OAR) 736-004-0085 (2)(d), for anyone less than 16 years old.

The Oregon ATV Safety Youth Rider Endorsement Program website is up and running. Take a look at the number of classes being offered. On-line registration is a few weeks away. Until then, registrations can be downloaded. Go to www.oregonatvsafety.com

Bio-security is **VERY** Important! Please do **YOUR** part!

Biosecurity is a set of preventive measures designed to reduce the risk of transmission of infectious diseases, quarantined pests, invasive alien species, and living modified organisms.

(Wikipedia 6/2011)

In some ways, fair is not the best place to witness bio-security. We keep our animals in a hot barn, usually within "nose touching" distance and then we put them in a class (especially pigs) where they have many opportunities to touch. However, there are some very simple things **YOU** can do to help keep your animal and those around you healthy(ier).

- NEVER share feed or water buckets/pans
- Disinfect your hands between animals
- Educate the public! Don't let them walk through the barns petting noses of all 25 horses in the line. Ask them not to, but be sure and explain why...that they could be carrying illness, disease, etc. from horse to horse; even though we believe ALL our horses to be healthy. Don't forget to share the healthy part, otherwise the new rumor will be we have sick 4-H horses in the barn.
- Don't share tack or equipment without disinfecting between animals.
- When you arrive at a show where other animals have been in your stall or pen, disinfect it before you put your animals in.
- Let water fall into the bucket or trough, don't submerge the end of the hose in the bucket.
- Don't stand around, if you don't have to, with animal noses touching, put your animal away, then come back and visit or put yourself between animals.
- NEVER bring a sick animal to a show

It's also important to keep yourself healthy.

- Never eat in a barn or animal environment. Eat outside or in your camping area.
- Wash your hands before eating
- Wash your hands after handling an animal or cleaning an area
- Encourage the public to wash after each barn and to **NOT** eat in the barn.

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Dressing for Fair

Just your annual reminder about the dress code expectations at the county fair. Ladies, when showing your animals, button those blouses up, one button undone is acceptable, any more than that is unnecessary.

Whether in herdsmanship or just hanging with your club, leave the short shorts, the spaghetti strings, and the beer ad T-shirts at home. No matter how cool they look, it's NOT the look we're after. Dress more conservative, cool for the weather, but think about how the public perceives you and thus the entire 4-H program.

There is no good place for flip-flops at the fair. Bring shoes, soles, depending on species, event, or project area.

Bio-security is VERY Important! Please do YOUR part!

Biosecurity is a set of preventive measures designed to reduce the risk of transmission of infectious diseases, quarantined pests, invasive alien species, and living modified organisms.

(Wikipedia 6/2011)

In some ways, fair is not the best place to witness bio-security. We keep our animals in a hot barn, usually within “nose touching” distance and then we put them in a class (especially pigs) where they have many opportunities to touch. However, there are some very simple things YOU can do to help keep your animal and those around you healthy(ier).

- NEVER share feed or water buckets/pans
- Disinfect your hands between animals
- Educate the public! Don't let them walk through the barns petting noses of all 25 horses in the line. Ask them not to, but be sure and explain why...that they could be carrying illness, disease, etc. from horse to horse; even though we believe ALL our horses to be healthy. Don't forget to share the healthy part, otherwise the new rumor will be we have sick 4-H horses in the barn.
- Don't share tack or equipment without disinfecting between animals.
- When you arrive at a show where other animals have been in your stall or pen, disinfect it before you put your animals in.
- Let water fall into the bucket or trough, don't submerge the end of the hose in the bucket.
- Don't stand around, if you don't have to, with animal noses touching, put your animal away, then come back and visit or put yourself between animals.
- NEVER bring a sick animal to a show

It's also important to keep yourself healthy.

- Never eat in a barn or animal environment. Eat outside or in your camping area.
- Wash your hands before eating
- Wash your hands after handling an animal or cleaning an area
- Encourage the public to wash after each barn and to NOT eat in the barn.

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Fair Entries!

Don't forget, fair entries are due in our office (with stall fees) by 4 pm on July 1. Meeting this deadline is CRITICAL to the efficiency of our office. I can't stress enough how important meeting this deadline is. Entering fair entries is a process and it's a process that is best and most accurately done in order. Please get your fair entries to us on or BEFORE July 1.

Horse folks, your camping is also due with your fair entries. Again, if you want to camp during horse fair, your request and payment needs to be here by July 1!

If for some reason you can't pay, don't hold up your entries, stall or horse camping forms. Get them in, we'll work out the payment!



Dressing for Fair

Just your annual reminder about the dress code expectations at the county fair. Ladies, when showing your animals, button those blouses up, one button undone is acceptable, any more than that is unnecessary.

Whether in herdsmanship or just hanging with your club, leave the short shorts, the spaghetti strings, and the beer ad T-shirts at home. No matter how cool they look, it's NOT the look we're after. Dress more conservative, cool for the weather, but think about how the public perceives you and thus the entire 4-H program.

There is no good place for flip-flops at the fair. Bring shoes, soles, depending on species, event, or project area.

Have fun and enjoy the fair!

Silent Auction!

Don't forget, items needed. Turn your leathercraft, or food preservation or photography or other project into a silent auction basket. Start NOW! Remember, only one auction item per member, so if you are already selling an animal, you may not also enter a silent auction item. But all others, this is for you! Ask your leader for specifics, or give the office a call. The majority of the basket must be made or produced by the member, it must look presentable, and the member must be able to be present on auction day. ccb

Hand Out Water and Refreshments. Helping with the crowd, buyers will need water, need help finding a place to sit, answering questions, etc. Adults or Youth; Shifts: 10-12, 2-4, 4-6

Runners. This is running the buyer "receipt" from the auction table to the buyer for signature and completion, then bringing it to the "bank" on grounds. Adults or Youth; 10-12, 2-4, 4-6, 6-finish

The Auction Committee will be setting up a table on the way out of the fairgrounds, after the sale, for buyers to pick up the appreciation gift the auction committee purchases on your behalf. However, this will NOT be a place for you to leave additional gifts. 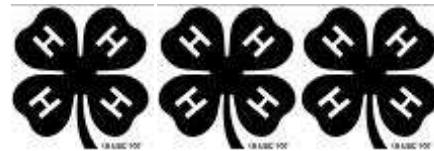
